Term: Nasogastric Tube (NGT)

Support: Prematuridade

Nasogastric Tube (NGT):

Made of soft plastic so that it doesn't hurt the baby, a tube that goes through the nose and passes through the esophagus into the stomach. The NG tube is used to take things out of the stomach and deliver food and medicine into the stomach. It is also used to check residuals. While it's not the greatest thing to look at and a bit discomfiting to the infant, they quickly

become used to it and it's very helpful in keeping your baby well nourished and hydrated.

Questions to Ask the Doctor:

1. How long will my baby need this feeding tube?
2. Is there a medical issue relating to my child's need for a feeding tube?
3. What is being done by the team to help my baby learn to feed orally?
4. Are there feeding therapies the team is doing or that I can be doing to stimulate my child?
5. Is there anything else I should know about this?

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True or False: Myths About Feeding Tubes

Premies in the NICU with serious feeding issues can often lead to the requirement of a feeding tube as they approach their discharge date. Unprepared, parents are full of questions and concerns about the long-term. Our friends at the Feeding Tube Awareness Foundation help us to dispel common myths.

You can't eat by mouth when you have a feeding tube. False. Tube feeding can supplement what is eaten by mouth. As long as your child is allowed by her doctor to eat and drink, she can continue to do so after receiving a feeding tube. Oral eating should be encouraged as much as possible to maintain or develop oral eating skills.

Tube feeding is forever.

It depends. Some children have medical conditions that will require them to have feeding tubes their whole lives. But for many children, tube feeding is temporary. Children are able to wean off their feeding tubes once they are no longer medically necessary. It is often difficult to estimate how long a feeding tube will be needed, especially if the child's medical condition is not yet fully understood.
