Preemie Terms: NICU

Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) (aka Special Care Baby Unit/SCBU):

Area of the hospital in which your Preemie will be staying until Discharge Day. Levels of care are distinguished by specialty. All hospitals have variations on their NICU classifications, but generally they fall in one of three "level" categories:

Level I: Support fairly uncomplicated late pre-term births from 35 weeks and up.



Level II: Support births from 32 weeks up and do not require high maintenance care. This hospital will usually have a neonatologist on staff and a nursery devoted to NICU infants.

Level III: Supports full-on NICU with neonatologists, neonatal nurses, and respiratory therapists. Handles the most severe cases of prematurity and those that may require surgery.

With a simple device placed in a lightweight but durable and snug baby-sock (with larger socks included in the set to accommodate growth), parents can check on their infant's heart rate and oxygen level in realtime using the Owlet app and receive alerts. The Owlet's base unit is multi-functional as an inroom charging unit, a colorcoded notifer of the baby's overall status and a day/night light. A must-have for preemies!




