## Term: Bradycardia (Brady)

Bradycardia (Brady): When your the baby trying to pass a baby's heart rate goes down below its normal range. You will usually hear the term "he's brady-ing" or "having bradys." This is a very common event in preemies; however, there can be any number of causes, significant and insignificant. It can be something as natural as



stool, or simply experiencing reflux or it may be something more dangerous when the baby's heart rate is lower for more than 15 to 20 seconds.

Most hospitals have a general "brady" rule linked to discharge day (at Cedars, the infant had to be "brady-free" for 5 days before getting off the monitors and going home), though this process will vary dramatically from one NICU to another.



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## **Q&A**: What are the Top Myths Surrounding RSV?

RSV season is less than a month away, so we are grateful to our friends at the Alliance for Patient Access (AfPA) for dispelling myths surrounding RSV.

- 1. RSV is a common cold. False! While RSV may "look" like a common cold, in older adults and young infant, it can be life threatening. RSV is 10 times more deadly than the flu.
- 2. *RSV* is spread through coughing. False! RSV is spread through droplets and the live virus can live for hours on surfaces such as countertops. RSV is highly contagious and this is why good hand washing is so important to prevent the spread of RSV.
- 3. There is a medication to help prevent RSV. True! Synagis (also known as palivizumab) is a medication that can help prevent RSV. Babies at risk for RSV are given Synagis every month during RSV season (Oct-March in most places).
- 4. My baby can only get RSV once a year. False! After recovering from an RSV infection, your baby is still susceptible to getting it again if exposed, as we do not build immunity to this virus after getting it once. This is why babies who get Synagis need to have the injections monthly, because the antibody in the injection "wears off" in ~28days.
