Term: Necrotizing Enterocolitis

Necrotizing Enterocolitis (NEC):

A disease that primarily infects the immature bowel of the premature infant. Intestines are perhaps the weakest in the body's systems and are easily infected by infection and blood flow changes. NEC is a toxic inflammation in the intestine that literally kills the intestine.



Your baby's medical team knows that it is so very important to watch for this and to catch it immediately since it can spread so quickly and cause significant and quite serious damage. Often, NEC is caught by the signs of sepsis in the blood stream.

The least invasive measure of treatment is to have your infant be treated with a series of antibiotics while remaining off foods and being fed through a central line or Broviac. In the worst case scenario your baby will be subjected to surgery where the sick part of the intestine is removed.



In essence they have traded being at the hospital with bringing the world into their house in the form of visiting nurses, nursing care, medical equipment vendors, therapists and more. Here are a couple of tips to keep sanity and a schedule:

Set Specific Hours. The doctors have set office hours, why not you? Set up chunks of time for these incoming appointments.

Be Firm. It is time to learn the *polite* version of "no" and stick to it. You have done enough working around everyone else. They need to help you for a change. Remember you are your baby's advocate!

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

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Q: What are signs that families could use a coach?

A: 1) feeling overwhelmed, lonely, isolated and sometimes ill-equipped as a parent, 2) feeling frequent waves of emotions (i.e. guilt, anxiety, anger) 3) experiencing a loss of your identity, anxiety over whether your child will develop normally and/or difficulties in your relationships, and 4) wanting to move forward but feel stuck.
