

After the NICU: Researching Feeding Clinics

Preemies sometimes need help with feeding issues beyond the NICU days. Feeding clinics can be helpful and here are some questions you should ask:

- Is your program sensory based or behaviorally-based (i.e. force feeding)? One on one or group?
- What types of tools do you use in your program?
- What types of therapeutic approaches do you use?
- What is your success rate with premature infants on a feeding tube? Not on a feeding tube?
- How does your clinic define "success"?
- Do you take insurance and/or Medicaid?

Parent Tips for Pros: Feeding Concerns Are a Real Stressor

Professionals often look at the feeding side of preemies as a purely clinical concern to be resolved in order to discharge the baby. But it goes farther than that.

Tip #1: Feeding is a Bonding Mechanism.

Whether breastfeeding or bottle feeding, parents view this time as not only nutritional but also familial. Holding, cuddling, eye-to-eye contact, talking and more allows a parent to bond with his/her infant. So when a parent is unable to feed their child in the "normal" way it can be a huge stress. Until a parent can bottle or breastfeed, tell them to, if possible, to talk to and touch their child while tube feeding.

Tip #2: Kangaroo Care Does Promote Feeding.

A baby that is bonded with its mother through skinto-skin contact will provide opportunities for natural breastfeeding moments. This is the most natural of clinical moments. Skin-to-skin is medicine for the baby and the mother!

Tip #3: Parent Stress Can Equal Baby Stress
Notice that a parent's stress often carries over to the baby? Getting a parent to vent his/her stress and "let it out" can bring a different mood to bedside, thereby helping everyone concerned.
